Coping with Covid Stressors

So far this year our students are reporting feeling stressed more than ever before, and they link their stress directly to Covid. Every day, we are inundated with information of individual and organizational responses to Covid. The constant news cycle, social media influx, and chatter at the watercooler increase our anxiety around this issue and overwhelm our ability to logically process the information. Then, when we come home, we begin to digest the deluge of information with our family/spouse often, in front of our children sharing our stress with them.

As Covid does not appear to be going away we must be mindful of how these external stressors are impacting our students. Villagers are sharing that they are anxious and nervous about Covid and its impact. Their minds are sponges and both feel and understand when the adults around them are feeling stressed and yet may not fully understand why.

At Village, we are seeing the manifestation of stress take many forms. Some students complain of stomach aches, frequent urination, irritability, or extreme emotional responses, and these are all completely appropriate and understandable given the circumstances.

But how can we help lessen our children's stress during these times? First, we can monitor the programs that are on in our homes and the messages being heard. Oftentimes, our children are too young to understand the meaning of what is being said but can pick up the emotion in the speaker's voice. You can also ask your student to share what causes them to feel stressed. Do not diminish their feelings by saying "don't worry about that" or "that's a grown-up issue." While they do not need to know all the particulars, if our children have questions the best thing to do is answer them honestly. The absence of information increases their stress response. Finally, focus on the positives with your child. The more you point out all the things that are going right for them and their amazing experiences, the better. The more positivity they see in the world, the less stress they will have overall. My hope is that we can work together to maintain the innocence of our children and to help make their world a little brighter and less stressful.

What is the plan when we have a case of Covid-19 at school?

While I am optimistic that our quarantine issues will not continue, I am also a realist. I am sure we will eventually cross a bridge where a school or bus quarantine occurs again. When this occurs, we will need your assistance to ensure that safety precautions are adhered to and protocols are followed. Additionally, as you heard from Mr. Hughes, new Livingston County Health Department Guidelines were released to help keep our kiddos at school. It is imperative that you watch the following video to understand your choices regarding quarantining your student.

Parent Presentation - LCHD

Here are the high points of the alternative to quarantine process:

- Your children will be able to stay in school if they are exposed to a student that is positive for Covid-19, if they...
 - ... wear a mask for the entirety of the quarantine period including stopping in the office to demonstrate that they have an appropriately fitting mask on the first day of return
 - ... take a Covid-19 test daily and report their negative results to the LCHD
 - ... complete a symptom assessment daily prior to attending school
 - ✓ ... agree to sit 6ft or more away from non-exposed students during snack and lunch
- If your student at any point fails to comply with one of these guidelines, the LCHD will switch them to a standard quarantine and they will have to stay home

When your student is exposed, our office will contact you and have you pick up your child. Your student will not be able to come back to school until you have been contacted by Livingston County Health Department, your student has completed their first Covid test, and you have uploaded their negative test results on the LCHD app.

The "alternative to quarantine" process is meant to keep students learning and in the academic environment. We appreciate your support and willingness to help us navigate these difficult times.

Progress Reports

We are continuing forward with our new progress report format. Each marking period you will receive an in-depth look at the standards being taught to your student. Additionally, you will have specific comments available for you to read and find out a bit more about how your student is doing specifically. You will also notice that you are provided insight into your student's social-emotional health and well-being at Village. As a district, we feel that this information is vital to parents as well. With our explicit work and learning around social-emotional health and wellness here at Village, this is a great opportunity to engage in a dialogue about how your student is feeling about school, friends, and academics. Finally, we have included an "NA" scoring comment on this year's progress report. This stands for Not Assessed. This means that your student was not assessed on a topic or standard due to an extenuating circumstance (quarantines, absences, etc.). You can then follow up with the teacher once those assessments are completed.

STEM Spot

Our STEM program is off and running. Mrs. Schroder is doing an amazing job and students are learning each day about the need to creatively problem-solve, collaborate with a team, and provide an explanation for their work. Most recently, the students are completed what is called the Spaghetti Tower Challenge. This challenge asks students to build the tallest tower using dry spaghetti noodles and marshmallows. Pre-planning, strategizing with their teammates, and executing the activity were hallmarks of the challenge.
